

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Rockford wants to become one of the top 25 cities by 2020. Cherry Valley UMC wants to become a Healthier Congregation. A healthy congregation is growing in a number of areas with ministries that are engaging and energetic. These past six months we used the Natural Church Development (NCD) process as a way to work on a specific area—our Passionate Spirituality.

Passionate Spirituality is not the particular style of how a church expresses the movement of the Holy Spirit. It is the degree to which the persons within the congregation actively live out their faith with commitment, passion, and enthusiasm. Key indicators of a depleted spiritual passion are being "burned out" or having an inability to commit. The good news is that a person's current spiritual state is not as important as a desire to grow.

This is the plan we launched December 1, 2016—

Goal for Sensory Spiritual Style: To improve people's sensory experience during worship to bring about a deeper and more joyful experience of the Holy Spirit.

Objectives:

Three out of the five senses will be incorporated into every worship service, varying the sense and experience of that sense so as not to repeat the same thing for longer than one month. This will be measured each Monday.

Offer at least one worship service that is not in the sanctuary and provides an experience that includes all five senses.

Goal for Scripture-Driven Spiritual Style: To draw people closer to God through scripture. Objectives:

Low-Tech Focus Group: For 15 people to research and enjoy the Bible for six months using the team approach.

High-Tech Focus Group: For 10 people to participate in a six-month daily reflection on a suggested Bible Application.

Goal for Sharing Spiritual Style: To provide opportunities for people to share the love of Christ with others.

Objectives:

For 50 people to participate in the Rockford Rescue Mission Event scheduled for Sunday evening, January 29, 2017.

Schedule during worship a time for people to share their experience during the Rockford Rescue Mission event (possibly include a client and staff member).

Have you witnessed or experienced any of these objectives? What are your reflections on these goals? Did we do what we set out to do or not? You'll have an opportunity to comment at our first TOWN HALL MEETING after worship on June 4th during Fellowship time.

Sharing God's Bounty—June

Overcoming Pride

In his book *Mere Christianity*, C. S. Lewis wrote the following about pride: "Pride is the one vice of which no man in the world is free; which everyone in the world loathes when he sees it in someone else; and of which hardly any people, except Christians, ever imagine they are guilty of themselves." We demonstrate pride when go our own way and do our own thing. It is "my will be done" not "thy will be done."

Pride is sinful and destructive. It destroys gratitude to God for all his kindness to us. It destroys our desire and ability to serve others. It destroys contentment for it feeds our competitive nature so that we are not satisfied with just being wealthy or intelligent, but we want to be wealthier and more intelligent than anyone else.

Through faith, we are changed by God from being self-serving, proud people into people who are humble and seek the welfare of others before ourselves. God changes us from being people who always want to be in control into people who desire to be controlled by God. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth" (Matthew 5:5). In Rick Warren's book The Purpose Driven Life, he wrote, "Humility is not thinking less of yourself; it is thinking of yourself less." Through faith, we understand our need for humility. We become more humble as God molds and transforms us by the renewing of our mind (Romans 12:2).

Pride has no place in our lives as Christians and stewards. First Peter 5:6 reads, "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand that he may lift you up in due time." It is God alone who can exalt us (Psalm 75:7). If Christ himself, God's only begotten Son, humbled himself, should we not follow his example and humble ourselves? Because Christ humbled himself, God exalted him (Philippians 2:9)

David, the shepherd-king, put our situation in proper perspective: "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?" (Psalm 8:3-4). The inference is that, although we are insignificant, God has exalted us: "You made [us] ruler over the works of your hands; you put everything under [our] feet."

Humility allows us to accept our smallness and God's goodness. In the words of Martin Luther, humility is the decision to "let God be God." We are stewards through humility. We are to honor him with what we have, what we are, and what he will make of us.

Let us be generous with gifts we can give to others: Time, Good Example, Acceptance, Seeing the Best in People, Self-esteem, Self-disclosure, Helping Someone Learn Something New, Listening, Fun, and Letting Others Give to You

Wednesday, June 14 at 7:00pm Flight Behavior by Barbara Kingsolver.

Flight Behavior is a brilliant and suspenseful novel set in present day Appalachia; a breathtaking parable of catastrophe and denial that explores how the complexities we inevitably encounter in life lead us to believe in our particular chosen truths. Kingsolver's riveting story concerns a young wife and mother on a failing farm in rural Tennessee who experiences something she cannot explain, and how her discovery energizes various competing factions—religious leaders, climate scientists, environmentalists, politicians—trapping her in the center of the conflict and ultimately opening up her world.

Thursday, July 20 at 7:00pm *Small Victories* by Anne Lamott. In Small Victories, Lamott writes about faith, family, and community in essays that are both wise and irreverent. She offers a new message of hope that celebrates the triumph of light over the darkness in our lives. Our victories over hardship and pain may seem small, she writes, but they change us—our perceptions, our perspectives, and our lives. Lamott writes of forgiveness, restoration, and transformation, how we can turn toward love even in the most hopeless situations, how we find the joy in getting lost and our amazement in finally being found. Profound and hilarious, honest and unexpected, the stories in Small Victories are proof that the human spirit is irrepressible.

Wednesday, August 23 at 7:00pm The 100-Year-Old Man Who Climbed Out the Window and Disappeared by Jonas Jonasson

A reluctant centenarian much like Forrest Gump (if Gump were an explosives expert with a fondness for vodka) decides it's not too late to start over. After a long and eventful life, Allan Karlsson is still in good health, and in one day, he turns 100. A big celebration is in the works, but Allan really isn't interested. So he decides to escape. He climbs out the window in his slippers and embarks on a hilarious and entirely unexpected journey. It would be the adventure of a lifetime for anyone else, but Allan has a larger-than-life backstory: Not only has he witnessed some of the most important events of the twentieth century, but he has actually played a key role in them.

Spiritual Insights

We, as church members of Christian denominations, seem to move from one event to the next without knowing that these events were prophesied in the Old Testament and fulfilled in the New Testament. The Word of God, "The Bible", can only be understood if we study the Old and New Testaments together.

For instance, the crucifixion of Jesus. Old Testament prophesies fulfilled by Christ:

Psalms 69:21 for my thirst, they gave me vinegar.

Zachariah 12:10 They shall look on Him whom they have pierced.

Psalms 22:19 casting lots for Jesus' garments.

In fact, all of Psalms 22 is a vivid picture of the crucifixion of Christ.

Jesus died as a Passover Lamb. He offers Himself as a sacrifice for all humanity. Jesus was crucified at the sixth hour, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed. The Passover lamb must be unblemished, legs unbroken (Exodus 12:46).

When it is remembered that crucifixion is a Roman--not Jewish--execution, along with the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies, the proof of Spiritual inspiration cannot be denied.







