

Living a Stewardship Lifestyle

When we discuss stewardship, we may immediately start to think of giving our time and money. Stewardship certainly involves giving and serving, but, even more, our stewardship is incorporated into a way of life. It does not consist of just isolated events. When God's word and love fill our hearts and minds, our stewardship becomes a lifestyle. As a lifestyle, it defines who we are and what we do. It is our vocation. With transformed hearts, we express our faith in the way we live our lives. Through faith, God provides motivation and power to live the Christian life in a growing awareness of redeeming grace.

In defining stewardship, W. H. Greever wrote, "Christian stewardship is the practice of the Christian religion. It is neither a department of life nor a sphere of activity. It is the Christian conception of life as a whole, manifested in attitudes and actions." Our faithful stewardship, as it reflects God's love, becomes our approach to life. It is more being than doing. Our deeds of stewardship such as using time wisely or helping the needy arise out of being stewards. Stewards are who we are. Stewardship is a whole life response to God out of gratitude and thanksgiving for all of his love, goodness, and mercy. T. A. Kantonen wrote, "The life of stewardship is nothing less than 'total devotion' to the Christ who is known as a real, living personal presence in the hearts of believers, a genuine loyalty that is expressed not in mere opinion or sentiment but in character and conduct."

It does not take talented people to be faithful stewards, but it takes all there is of us. It takes our total commitment. Stewardship is our response to God's abundant grace in all aspects of life. This faithful stewardship is only possible when we acknowledge our sinfulness and our forgiveness through faith in Christ. God gives us faith so he can use us to carry out his plan, which is to save all people. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, we acknowledge God in all things and in all places. As faithful stewards, we know that all we have belongs to him so we can give generously of our time, talents, and money.



Summer is a great time for hiking, picnicking, and enjoying the great outdoors, but we need to be aware of the dangers of ticks, especially after the mild winter we had. There will be a lot more critters out there! Ticks are a source of Lyme disease and other dangerous viruses. Protect yourself against tick bites.

- -Avoid places with thick vegetation, high grass and leaf litter
- -Walk in the center of a trail
- -Use repellent that contains 20%DEET on exposed skin
- -Use products that contain permethrin to treat clothing, boots, pants, socks, and tents
- -Bathe or shower as soon as possible
- -Treat pets with products that repel or kill ticks
- -Dry clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing.

Exodus 3:13-14


Activity Page

The Rockford Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON) clinic is held on the fourth Sunday of the month at Court Street United Methodist Church, 215 N. Court St. Rockford, between 2-5PM. Clients are seen by appointment only by contacting the Central Scheduler at 773-609-4401. When making an appointment the client will be asked specific questions regarding their case and if they need child care and an interpreter.

Immigration is one of the most complex areas of the law. Immigrants need trained and authorized assistance to help as they complete paperwork, and many have difficulty finding reliable, high quality legal representation.

<u>Volunteers make Justice For Our Neighbors possible.</u> They are the first to welcome those seeking legal help. Some areas to volunteer are Hospitality, Intake, ChildCare, Translators, Greeters. HELPING CHILDREN: Winnebago County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) has served our community for 30 years. As a non profit, volunteer based organization, CASA's goal is to represent the children involved in Abuse and Neglect Court through volunteer advocacy, ensuring that the children's best interests are always represented. In order to do this, CASA trains volunteers to serve as the child's guardian ad litem, or guardian at law, and works with the Court, professional case workers, therapists, and families to find a safe, permanent home for each of our children.

Court Appointed Special Advocates Often through the foster care system, children are moved from home to home, changing schools and friends, each time they are moved. This is confusing and often chaot-

ic for a child to adjust to. The role of the CASA is important for each child to have one person representing their best interests at all times.
