

I'm not a big fan of social media. I set up a Facebook account when my daughter was in high school only to keep track of her posts, and have only posted four or five times during the intervening fifteen years. My Twitter account exists only because it was a requirement for an on-line course that I took several years ago. Ironically, I find that the best thing about these and other social media sites is the same thing that I dislike.

Once people transitioned to social media, they quit forwarding jokes and questionable (I'm being charitable.) news articles to my email accounts. Because I don't check my Facebook feeds or read Twitter or Instagram, I don't have to deal with the additional mental clutter. While attempting not to sound like a curmudgeon, I just don't like it.

Several years ago, I received a forwarded e-mail from a parishioner which I could tell he'd shared with many others. The news was meant to be inspirational; but it was wrong. Although I'm generally loathe to do so, I hit "reply-all" in order to correct what had been shared. I don't doubt that the man who forwarded that item was sincere. I suspect that he had received it from somebody he trusted. That was my concern, people trusted him. That's how it goes.

Although I'm generally in favor of sharing information, we need to be sure what we share is the truth. As Christians, truth is important. In the parable of the talents, the master rewards the two servants who were faithful "in little things" by putting them in charge of greater things; but the servant who buried the little that had been entrusted to him lost everything and more. We need to be faithful with little truths and diligently avoid even inadvertently passing on those things that aren't true.

We have a pretty bizarre and far-fetched truth to share, that God became human in Jesus Christ, that he died for our sins, and that he rose again. How can we be believed with that truth if we are not diligent in maintaining a commitment to only sharing the truth of more "reasonable" information?

Unfortunately the near anonymity of posting and forwarding of information via social media tends to encourage zingers and incomplete news void of any nuance. What if we as Christians expected better, if only of ourselves? Our friends and families likely trust us. Therefore, we must be diligent in retelling (by reposting or even "liking") that which we can confidently say is true, even when that means curbing an impulse to immediately pass on those things that confirm our own opinions.


We have a story to tell to the nations that can conquer darkness. May all that we do build confidence in our integrity for the sake of that story.





2 Samuel 22:1-8

And David spoke unto the Lord the words of this song in the day that the Lord had delivered him out of the hand of all his enemies, and out of the hand of Saul: and he said, The Lord is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer; ³ the God of my rock; in him will I trust: he is my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my high tower, and my refuge, my savior; thou saves me from violence. ⁴ I will call on the Lord, who is worthy to be praised: so shall I be saved from mine enemies. ⁵ When the waves of death compassed me, the floods of ungodly men made me afraid; the sorrows of hell compassed me about; the snares of death prevented me; in my distress I called upon the Lord, and cried to my God: and he did hear my voice out of his temple, and my cry did enter into his ears. Then the earth shook and trembled; the foundations of heaven moved and shook, because he was angry.

David always praised the Lord for victory over his enemies. God will move heaven and earth to answer our prayers.

2 Samuel 11:2-26

And it came to pass in an evening tide that David arose from off his bed, and walked upon the roof of the king's house: and from the roof he saw a woman washing herself; and the woman was very beautiful to look upon. And David sent and enquired after the woman. And one said, Is not this Bath-Sheba, the daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite? And David sent messengers, and took her; and she came in unto him, and he lay with her; for she was purified from her uncleanness: and she returned unto her house. ⁵ And the woman conceived, and sent and told David, and said, "I am with child". And it came to pass in the morning, that David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent it by the hand of Uriah. 15 And he wrote in the letter, saying, Set ye Uriah in the forefront of the hottest battle, and retire ye from him, that he may be smitten, and die. ¹⁶ And it came to pass, when Joab observed the city that he assigned Uriah unto a place where he knew that valiant men were. ¹⁷ And the men of the city went out, and fought with Joab: and there fell some of the people of the servants of David; and Uriah the Hittite died also. And when the wife of Uriah heard that Uriah her husband was dead, she mourned for her husband. And when the mourning was past, David sent and fetched her to his house, and she became his wife, and bore him a son. But the thing that David had done displeased the Lord.

David was not perfect, but he loved the Lord always. David killed Bath-Sheba's husband because he lusted after her. God could not abide this sin.

2 Samuel 12

God spoke to David, "Wherefore hast thou despised the commandment of the Lord, to do evil in his sight? Thou hast killed Uriah the Hittite with the sword, and hast taken his wife *to be* thy wife, and hast slain him with the sword of the children of Ammon. ..David responded "The Lord also hath put away thy sin; thou shalt not die. Howbeit, because by this deed thou hast given great occasion to the enemies of the Lord to blaspheme, the child also *that is* born unto thee shall surely die."

David's heart was always with God. God was angry with David, but David repented for his sin knowing that the consequence of his sin would be the death of his child. David mourned for his child but understood that all sin has consequences. David repented of his sin; God bestowed forgiveness and grace upon David. David expresses God's forgiveness and grace to him when he states "But now he is dead, wherefore should I fast? Can I bring him back again? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me." David would be in heaven with his child by God's forgiveness and grace that was brought about by David's repentance and humility to God.

In the second weekly meeting of the month, scouts did a LEGO night, and discussed the possibilities of a high adventure outing in 2021. On the third Sunday of February, our Boy Scout Troop joined the Girl Scout Troop for downhill skiing at Chestnut Mountain; beautiful weather.



This is also the week for the monthly PLC meeting (Patrol Leaders Council) and the adult Committee meeting. The final Troop meeting will be our first swim night of the year. - We are looking forward to the addition of new scouts to the Troop. We're expecting some Webelos (Arrow of Light) Scouts to cross over into a Boy Scout troop. That same night, our youth will elect some of the new honor campers into the Order of the Arrow.
- Early in March, the Blackhawk Area Council will recognize some adults as Silver Beaver recipients and recognize the 2019 Eagle Scouts.
- The Troop is going to swim again in the East High School pool for our second swim of the year.
- Our newest scouts will get an early start on requirements on the Troop's Advancement Campout.
- Our more experienced scouts will get to do some teaching by exercising their skills of instruction with the EDGE method.

The fourth meeting of the month will be a quarterly Court of Honor and Information Night for all related to the Troop. We get to swim again for the final meeting of March.


