

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: ²a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; ³a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; ⁴a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; ⁵a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; ⁶a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; 'a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; ⁸a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace. What gain have the workers from their toil?

 ^{10}I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with.

¹¹He has made everything suitable for its time; moreover he has put a sense of past and future into their minds, yet they cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. 12 I know that there is nothing better for them than to be happy and enjoy themselves as long as they live; ¹³moreover, it is God's gift that all should eat and drink and take pleasure in all their toil. ¹⁴I know that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it; God has done this, so that all should stand in awe before him. ¹⁵That which is, already has been; that which is to be, already is; and God seeks out what has gone by. Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

What time is it? How one asks that question determines our response, as does the meaning of the word time. "What time is it?" with the emphasis on it serves as a curious chronological (from the Greek chronos (χρόνος)) inquiry. "What <u>time</u> is it?" with the emphasis on time, however, implies that there's something meaningful about the time. In Greek this would be kairos (Κάιρος) or the "time for" or "appointed time" as in "a time for every matter under heaven."

What time is it? By the calendar, we see that it is August. Astronomically we say it is late summer. Culturally we'd normally say that it's back-to-school time. Liturgically, we continue in ordinary time (days in order after Pentecost). In modern church life, we might say it's time for the new program year. For Cub fans, it's the time of year when usually we'd be hoping they'd just break our hearts now if they're going to blow it anyway; but not this year.

This year, things are different. Baseball season has only just begun. In our congregation, the usual return to Bible studies, choir practices and Sunday School has been disrupted. What exactly will back-to-school be? We really don't know.

Recently, we've returned to in-person worship in church. Rather than having time to extend our usual greetings or to engage in the Methodist third sacrament (eating) for fellowship, the physical distancing necessary to help prevent the spread of covid-19 gets in the way. We want to sing. We want to laugh. We want to dance. We want to embrace. We long for the time when we can and will do so.

We long for opportunities to gather and to sing and experience the first line of that Methodist standard "And are we yet alive, and see each other's face?" unmasked and ready to continue, "Glory and thanks to Jesus give for his almighty grace!"

Although we may have to wait to see each other's face, we are yet alive. The changes that we've faced due to this pandemic, have befuddled my plans for ministry and plans that we'd made in church council earlier this year. We won't be gather for game nights, movie nights, potlucks and cookouts, or a church camping weekend in 2020. We won't be travelling to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center for mission service. We won't be able to lead worship and serve a meal at the Rockford Rescue Mission until next year. But we are still called to ministry. This may not be the time for those things, but it is a time when we can remember Pastor Kim and her ministry in Africa. Bishop Dyck had asked churches across our conference to support her ministry as a special appeal to be collected at Annual Conference in June. Although Annual Conference has been rescheduled as a virtual gathering in November (with much a much more limited focus), we can continue to support her ministry. To that end, I invite you to consider a special gift for her ministry, and a maybe a card and note of encouragement for her and those with whom she ministers that we can collect and send to her. I know there are more possibilities. In normal times, pastors are expected to be the planners, but we've been befuddled having to spend time learning how to record or live-stream virtual worship service, and trying to figure out how to provide pastoral ministry without visiting homes and hospitals. Seminary never covered this. This season, provides an opportunity for the church (i.e. the people of Christ) to find a new voice in ministry as we share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through who we are. Together we can find new ways to praise God in worship, to build up one another in faith, and to serve Christ in our community.

Is this a time to speak or to remain silent? Is this a time to mourn or to dance our way into new life? What time is it?

I think it's time for Bible studies to resume, even though that means using ZOOM instead of heading to the church. I know it's time to give glory and thanks to Jesus for his grace, as we seek out God's purpose for us even now.

Update on our Missionary Reverend Young Seon (Christina) Kim

Recently I was invited to participate in a zoom session sponsored by the Board of Global Missions. Pastor Kim was one of several pastors who spoke at this meeting. It was so good to see her in real time and witness her enthusiasm for her work in Tanzania. I listened carefully; took notes so that I could share with you her progress. It is nothing short of remarkable what she has accomplished in her eight years in Tanzania.

Pastor Kim works closely with the United Methodist Church in Tanzania. She said the church has identified over 2000 active youth in 10 districts. Early on she created a program called 'Nifuate' which means 'Follow me.' She wrote a *Nifuate* training book on discipleship and has used it throughout the 10 districts. For 3 years she intentionally visited all 10 districts; and taught the leadership program on discipleship. She had a very deliberate process of goal setting and evaluation to develop trainers to continue the training program in each district. Once each district successfully achieved the goals of the program they would receive goats as their reward. In Tanzania, goats generate income and are highly valued by the people. She has since written a second book in the Swahili language; and is in the process of writing a 3rd book.

Another project she has developed is the Nifuate Center. The building is locally owned; sits on 4 acres and is located in a heavily populated Muslim area. Currently there are 60 children and she and the trainers are making good progress in spreading the Gospel.

The Mission Secondary school will open in January 2021 with 40+ students. It will be a co-ed boarding school and will charge tuition. Knowing that many Tanzanian's cannot afford the tuition, Pastor Kim has created a Scholarship and Sponsorship program to provide funding for deserving students. Her target is to get enough funding for 25 young adults. Less than 10% of the youth now go or finish secondary education. The majority of students will come from those 2000+ youth identified as belonging to the Tanzania United Methodist Church. The campus encompasses five acres and is 2/3 complete. All administration and teaching staff will be from Tanzania and the school will follow a standard high school curriculum of the country. An after school program will be staffed by missionaries. Anyone interested?

Tracing Sign In

Since the beginning of April, Troop 181 resumed weekly meetings on Tuesdays. We started with virtual meetings on Zoom, learning *Cyber Chip* (a scouting effort to teach scouts how to be safe on the internet). A number of topics followed.

On June 26, the state of Illinois went into Phase 4 of Restore Illinois. Troop 181 met outside on June 30 for the first time

in 16 weeks. We met at Rock Cut State Park. Every scout needed to *Be Prepared* with a mask, water bottle, & bug spray. The scouts got into their patrols and went on separate hikes around the Park to pick-up litter as a service project to our state and community.



On July 7, we met in Baumann Park for a scavenger hunt with the *GooseChase* app. The course was laid out by the troop's Senior Patrol Leader.

On July 14, the troop met in the parking lot at the church. It had been roped-off (the perfect place)! Our older scouts taught everything to know about food safety and eating. The stations included menu planning, equipment preparation, cooking eggs, making & eating banana boats, and proper clean-up of utensils.

We will be in Baumann Park again. And the final meeting of July will be a Family Night / Court of Honor. [All state and scouting guidelines will be followed for group sizes and social distancing, and the wearing of masks.]

All camping is still suspended for scouts, except for family camping. In August, our first meeting will include campfire planning for a future outing. We will follow the guidelines, and look for an opportunity to conduct the program. We will continue to innovate, design programs under current constrains, make exciting advances, and teach our scouts improve their lives under any conditions.




As any Chicago Cubs fan knows....there's always next year!

We are no longer using the Zoom app.


Spiritual Insights




