A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all, training us to renounce impiety and worldly passions, and in the present age to live lives that are selfcontrolled, upright, and godly, while we wait for the blessed hope and the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ. He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds.

Titus 2:11-14 (NRSV)

Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

As I sat pondering what to write this month, I kept getting drawn to Isaiah 9:2-7, one of the Scripture readings for Christmas Eve, along with the passage above.

Isaiah 9:2 says:

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness— on them light has shined.

You may think that I was drawn to the "light," but the darkness in that passage spoke loudest. Something about the darkness of winter sucks energy from my soul – even as I yearn for winter hikes, downhill skiing, and even a snowball fight when the opportunity arises. Ironically, the days have been getting shorter since June, and they'll start getting longer on December 21. When February finally arrives and the winter darkness has finally worn me out, there will be one hour and seventeen seconds more daylight than on December 1. Still too dark.

In the midst of the bleak midwinter, that frosty wind makes moan, and earth stands hard as iron, and water like a stone, there comes song of hope reminding me that heaven cannot hold our God, nor even earth sustain, as he comes to reign. Even then, thronged by angels, Mary's bliss, our Lord God Almighty, Jesus Christ, keeps the yearning hope going. Surrounded by darkness, what can I give him, except for my heart.

For many among us, this will be a lonely Christmas, as we limit our visits from house to house and celebration to celebration. For many among us, the year has been too lonely for too long. This year, rather than gathering for our annual "Thanksmas" (Sat. after Thanksgiving) event, my extended family will have done so virtually, with no chance for hugs or even just the comfort of sitting next to one another. I admit that those gatherings wear on me some years. There's only so much family one can stand. This year is different. I miss it already.

I depend on Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany to get me through the dark, bleak winter. However, after Thanksgiving weekend, I don't see other family: they live far away, and I work holidays. The expectation of Christmas, the advent candles, the songs, the joyful anticipation of children during the children's message – these are where that great light shines and sustains a burdened hope.

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Even as winter is only beginning, I hear George Harrison's voice singing, "It's been a long cold lonely winter... it feels like years since (the sun's) been here," words my little darlings that FOLLOW the pronouncement, "Here come the sun. It's alright."

Ironically, this year above others we may actually appreciate the expectancy of advent, not merely as a remembrance of what happened in Bethlehem over two thousand years ago, but in hopeful anticipation of what we can expect next year after vaccines have been approved and distributed and normalcy begins to resume, even as I wish it would arr. The past informs that hope, the light that shined so brightly upon that manger long ago, still sparkles from the heavens calling us to look through the darkness.

One way that we find that light is to remember where we've seen it before and where it has shined in our lives. As the church – as those who gather to worship together – that light twinkles in the cracking voice of the lady in the pew in front of us, the distracted shuffling of the boy in the pew across the aisle, or the silent prayer of the widower just a cushion away.

With the advent of the internet and unlimited calling plans, one of the Christmas traditions that has faded is sending Christmas cards: I mean cards that include a short personal note, whether the card itself is preprinted or contains a Christmas update.

This year, I invite you to send out four more cards than usual. (Even if you don't send out any, that's only four cards.) Send them to those who normally sit to the left and right and front and back of you in church. Maybe even send one to someone who used to sit by you in church years ago. Include a short hand-written note. It doesn't have to be long, just a sentence or a phrase of well-wishes or a reminder of what you miss about them.

Not only will you spread a little sustaining Son shine, you might even find some yourself with the hopeful anticipation of seeing the Son in all his glory, having given him your heart through your care and received his

Communion For Those Worshiping at Home

Have you been worshipping with us at home via YouTube or ZOOM, and missed participating in Holy Communion?

Now you, too, can join the in-person congregation in the celebration of the sacrament.

Those wishing to receive Communion are invited to attend a special virtual communion service at 11:45 a.m. on Sunday, November 29. The service will include a brief Scripture reading, reflection, prayer and the consecration of Communion elements. We will then arrange times for persons to obtain the communion elements prior to <u>Sunday, December 6</u> so that they will be on-hand ready to partake simultaneously with the in-person congregation. Times and days for pick-up/delivery will be announced later.

Regarding the sacrament of Holy Communion, St. Paul asks, "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a sharing in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a sharing in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread." (1 Cor. 10:16-17)

Not only do we meet Christ in the elements we partake during Holy Communion, but we <u>share</u> them with one another. Holy Communion is a unified thanksgiving (Eucharist) at the Lord's table. Although we engage Christ personally, we do not do so privately. Furthermore, the words of institution spoken by the celebrant (pastor) on behalf of the church are not an incantation but a communal prayer.

To remove the communal nature of the sacrament or to reduce the blessing into a magical incantation for private worship is heretical. Therefore, your pastor will not engage in the practice of asking persons to hold whatever bread or drink they want near a computer screen or television in the false expectation that anything other than private devotion is taking place.

By asking those who would like to partake of Communion with the congregation to join the virtual gathering for the consecration of communion elements, we will pray **together** around communion elements which we will **share**. Even though our distribution of elements will take longer than in in -person worship in that you may drive to the church to pick them up instead of merely walking to the alter, or have them delivered to your home instead of having them taken to your pew, we will be doing the same actions. By holding on to those elements until the entire congregation (virtual and in-person) is gathered on December 6, we will act in **common union** to experience Christ's holy presence.



Midwest Mission Update

The Northern Illinois Conference Board of Global Ministries congratulates the Midwest Mission Distribution Center on its 20th Anniversary celebration and thanks them for their invitation to celebrate its 20 years of ministry by sharing financial donations and in-kind supplies like those we usually bring during our Annual Conference Fill the Truck Drive.

In partnership with MMDC, the Northern Illinois Conference will reach many people around the world and around the corner with our prayers, a message of hope, laundry detergent, dish soap, household cleaners, toothpaste and other items to help them through a disaster or humanitarian crisis.

In 2019 due to the tremendous generosity of our churches in the NIC, we graduated from a trailer to a real truck that was completely packed with a new record of more than 50,000 items or 5,271 pounds!

In response to this year's pandemic, economic downturn, virtual annual conference and other challenges, MMDC helped us adopt a new 2020 vision and adapt to our changing circumstances by sending a fleet of trailers to more than a dozen collection sites in churches across the conference. Because of this year's numerous challenges, we anticipated a significant drop-off in items collected.



However, we are excited to announce that this year NIC churches donated an amazing 5,020 pounds of items and nearly \$1,000 for this year's Mission Challenge! We came within 250 pounds of last year's record-breaking collection amounts.

Two drivers, Ramon Ortiz, Operations Assistant at MMDC and Ray Trent from New Lenox UMC drove 686 miles over 13 hours picking up our donations!

We thank MMDC, the churches that served as collection sites, the volunteers who staffed those sites and everyone who contributed to the 2020 Mission Challenge. Through your participation, you have helped all of us look higher, see a vision of God that is greater than our current circumstances and be encouraged in our journeys to spiritual maturity.

A few shared their screens and showed us pictures of a former pet.



The 3rd meeting of the month was an Information Night, coupled with a Court of Honor. That was also performed on Zoom. Scouts were recognized for their rank and merit badge accomplishments over the past few months. We saw some nice smiles as their names were called. Further, different attendees with responsibilities got to inform every one of their cause, including operating details of the Christmas Tree Lot. There were 44 people attending



this zoom meeting.

The final meeting of the month will be at the Christmas Tree Lot. Please consider buying a field grown tree for Christmas this year. Troop 181 will be selling trees at the

corner of Harrison Ave. & Perryville Road, now until they are gone.

All of the meetings in December will be conducted at the Tree Lot. The scouts will do maintenance of the trees and fixtures and play some spread-out games. There is enough room for scouts to run, have fun, and keep a safe distances from others.
