


Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Happy Easter! But, Easter's over. Isn't it? Not quite. By the Church's calendar, Easter continues until Ascension Day – forty days after Easter Sunday. During those forty days, the risen Christ appeared to, met, and ate with the disciples before ascending into heaven. So why the rush to be done with Easter? It's similar to the rush to be done with Christmas on December 26, even though the Christmas/Epiphany season continues for forty days until Candlemas (the day that Mary and Joseph presented the infant Jesus in the temple) on February 2. Why the rush to get through it?

I did some math. Adding the forty days of Lent (the days anticipating Jesus' crucifixion and Resurrection) along with the six Sundays interspersed to the forty days of Easter, we find that almost a quarter of the Christian year is devoted to anticipating and experiencing Easter. What do we miss when we rush through it?

In Ecclesiastes 3, we hear that there is a season for every purpose under heaven – including a list of examples.

Where is the time to linger and time to move on? Do we take time to linger? The idea sounds almost heretical – lingering. However, lingering is not the same thing as loafing.

How do we allow our anticipation of the "next" event keep us from really relishing the moments that God gives us? What expectations keep us from lingering in the holy moments God gives us? Would it really be the end of the world if Easter dinner happened at 3:00 instead of noon so that we can linger in the joy of the Resurrection? Or if we missed out on the best table at the café after church because we tarried too long to ponder God's love during the postlude? Or passed up the opportunity to meet a guest at fellowship time?

I often find myself rushing – even on vacation – making sure that I don't linger too long lest I miss the next thing on the agenda. Yet I've discovered the most profound moments come when I linger at painting in an art museum, along the shore of a mountain stream, on a grassy cliff, sitting silently in a pew, or when the other guest have left the party for that unhurried time with my host.

Take time to linger – to claim the profound peace that God wants you to experience. Don't worry about tarrying too long. God will tell you when it's time to move on, just as the angels told the apostles as they stood looking into heaven. Even then, it was so they could linger in anticipation of a new moment that God had instore. Those moments await us all. Let's take the time to experience them.

What is a Deacon, Anyway?

For two years now, I have been serving as the Deacon at CVUMC. I have loved getting to know you and assisting you in your call to servanthood. This is the first time this church has had a Deacon.

So, what is a deacon anyway and why would CVUMC need one? Let's discuss the difference between the two orders of ordained clergy in the United Methodist Church.

The first type that most are familiar with is an Elder. Pastor Mark is an ordained Elder. According to the UM Book of Discipline, the definition of an Elder is:

Those whose leadership in service includes preaching and teaching the Word of God, administration of the sacraments, ordering the church for its mission and service, and the administration of the Discipline of the church are ordained as Elders. Elders have a fourfold ministry of Word, Sacrament, Order and Service.

The second type of ordination is the Deacon. The UM Book of Discipline defines a Deacon as:

Very early in its history, the church instituted an order of ordained ministers to personify or focus the servanthood to which all Christians are called. These people were named Deacons. This ministry exemplifies and leads the Church in the servanthood every Christian is called to live both in the church and in the world. The Deacon embodies the interrelationship between worship in the gathered community and service to God in the world. Deacons have a fourfold ministry of Word, Service, Compassion and Justice.

Commonalities with both levels of ordained clergy:

Accountable to the Annual Conference and the Bishop

Accountable to their primary setting in ministry Can officiate services of Matrimony and Celebrations of Life (funerals), among other types of services

Responsible to teach and preach the Word Responsible to develop the call to servanthood that is common for every Christian

Must be educated at Masters level in theology, UM polity and doctrine

Differences are:

Deacons cannot bless or administer the sacraments of Communion or Baptism unless given special dispensation by the Bishop. However, it is expected that the Deacon assist the Elder in carrying out the Sacraments

Deacons are not appointed to positions by the Bishop and therefore must secure their own employment and sponsoring church

Deacons must have a ministry specialization with corresponding educational requirements being met and recertification every two years. Deacons focus their efforts in the local church on ministries of Compassion and Justice.

There is some crossover in the things we both can do, but there are distinct differences in how we are called into ministry and how we live out that calling.

CVUMC is my third church appointment since beginning as a clergy candidate in 2008. I graduated from Seminary in 2012 with a specialty in *Ministry With The Poor*, was commissioned as a Deacon in 2014 and ordained in 2017. I worked for many years with various non-profit organizations. These skills are applied to CVUMC in the empowering of her people to define and utilize their gifts for servanthood in the church and in the community. Primarily, this occurs through the Missions and Outreach team.

The other ways I serve CVUMC are in providing Pastoral Care and Coverage when the pastor is unavailable, officiating funerals and weddings, assisting with providing the Sacraments, worship leadership, preaching and teaching.

My primary appointment is as a Certified Independent Health Coach with 4HealthyU. My secondary appointment is as non-compensated staff to CVUMC. Here, you can expect me to be available 2-3 hours a week and 2 Sundays per month (except in winter where I volunteer as a Deacon for a small church in FL).


