A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: ² a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; ³a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up, 4 a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; ⁵a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; 6 a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; 7 a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; 8a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace. (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 NRSV)

Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Surprisingly, November is upon us. I say surprisingly because the Christmas tree forests and other displays have been out for a few weeks now. If it weren't for actual calendars, we could easily expect that we've had an exceptionally warm December and that the new year is upon us.

In Ecclesiastes 3 (a Bible passage many of us memorized by listing to the Byrds sing "Turn, Turn, Turn", we hear that there is a season and time for every matter under heaven. What season is it, now? Liturgically, the Christmas season begins on December 25. Commercially, it used to begin the day after Thanksgiving; but now seems to begin the day after Labor Day. What season is it, now?


Better yet, what matter under heaven can we anticipate at this moment? Bear with me in the following digression; I think it might offer a clue to seizing the opportunities that the next couple of months present to us.

Many of you know that I have two dogs, (Wire-haired Pointing Griffons). They are active and need opportunities to run off their energy, which usually takes place at a forest preserve. When we go into the field, they wear electronic training collars. At home, they wear invisible fence collars. As we leave in the morning for an excursion, I put on the training collar and remove the fence collar. Usually... One day this past month, when we got home from our hike and the dogs wanted out into the yard, Susan prepared to change their collars. She'd not gone on the hike with us, but asked, "Did you know that Nimrod is still wearing his yard collar?" Yikes! Fortunately, the collar will shut itself off after nine seconds outside the yard. It was loose; maybe he didn't feel it. Maybe he did. Did I miss his cry for help? (He was riding in the crate in the bed of my truck.) I never intended to hurt him. In fact, the entire excursion was meant to bring him joy. Regardless, he hasn't held a grudge. I suspect that he doesn't know that it was my fault; but it still bothers me.

We are entering a season in which families get together. For some families, this presents an exciting anticipation of joy. For other families, there might be a general sense of wariness. For some persons, there might be an overwhelming sense of dread. Why is that?

Even in exceptionally loving families, people get hurt. Sometimes that hurt lingers because the one who did something hurtful hasn't or won't acknowledge it. If Susan hadn't noticed my mistake, I wouldn't even suspect that I'd caused my dog discomfort. I was trying to do something nice.

I think that happens in families, too. When/where people are abusive, we should keep ourselves safe even if that means staying away. But God can use our worldly times to

work wonders for heavenly purposes. The entire purpose of Christmas (the Incarnation) is God's desire to be reconciled with us despite how our transgression has hurt him. I cannot think of a time that I ever intended to hurt God (even in those moments that I knew I shouldn't be doing what I was doing). Can you?

If I can be so bone-headed to cause God or dog pain by carelessness or misdirected attention, might I have hurt those whom I love? (That's a rhetorical question.) If I've done that, might the pain I've experienced from others be the same?

I can only speak to my experience having grown up near both sets of grandparents, my uncles and cousins, my parents' cousins and their kids so that time with even extended family was routine. That's not the case any longer. Over the past two years, we've even missed out on those once-a-year opportunities to be all together. In an age when a missing comma in a Facebook post, or using the wrong emoticon can turn loving words into hurtful words, we need time together.

Sometimes that time can be a "pain" or inconvenient. It's inconvenient that my family the most central location that my family can gather is at a truck stop in Iowa with limited time together. It's inconvenient that Susan's family is in the Quad-Cities. Even though it's not the case at the moment, there have been times when I really didn't want to be around certain family members. You may know that same feeling. Too often, I've discovered too late that any hurt I'd received was inadvertent or that the other was too ashamed to share their regret.

So much of what we hear around us invites division and claiming injury. In Romans 12:18, we hear, "If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all." For everything there is a season, and there is a time for every purpose under heaven. With the impending Thanksgiving holiday (season), can we give thanks by using the time to reach out to those whom we love – who may have hurt us or whom we have hurt, anticipating a new way of being together? I suspect that it will bring more satisfaction than any turkey dinner or pie.







