
I don't remember when or where I heard the following story, but I've been retelling it for at least twenty years.

A grandfather took his grandson to attend worship. The boy hadn't been in church before, so he was inquisitive about everything that was happening. When the acolytes lit the candles on the altar table, the boy asked, "Why are they doing that? What does it mean?" The grandfather replied, "They're bringing in the light of Jesus and that reminds us that he is with us." As the people rose for the reading of the Gospel, the boy asked, "Why did we stand up? What does that mean?" Again, his grandfather replied, "We stand as a sign of respect for the Word of God." When the preacher stepped up to the pulpit and then removed his watch setting where he could easily see, the boy asked, "What does that mean?" "That, sonny, doesn't mean a darn thing!"

Most of us are familiar with common postures that we do as church such as bowing our heads and folding/clasping our hands for prayer or standing for the reading of the Gospel. Someone asked me if I could explain why it is I, personally, do certain actions during worship and what they mean. If one person asks, often others wonder. What follows is an explanation regarding what some have noticed.

I wear no shoes during worship to remind myself that I am in God's presence as was Moses as he stood before the flaming bush and was instructed to remove his sandals. (Ex 3:5)

I often make the sign of the cross [three fingers from head to heart to left then right shoulder] which is a traditional prayer or blessing "In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit." Although, I picked it up at a United Methodist seminary, this tradition goes back to at least the 2nd century, and serves as a reminder of God's presence. Using three fingers reminds me of the Trinity; tracing the cross on the body invokes Jesus' death and resurrection. In the Eastern church, Christians trace from right to left shoulder as they "mirror" the sign of the cross during the priest's blessing.

Prior to the Gospel reading, I use my right thumb to trace a cross on my forehead, lips, and chest. I picked this up at an Episcopal seminary. Again, this is a prayer asking that the word of the Lord might be on my mind, my lips (speech), and my heart.

I bow when approaching or crossing before the communion table/cross as a sign of reverence for God's presence, and picked this up from my pastor when I was attending church in my twenties. [Although it is a similar action to when Roman Catholics genuflect, the difference is that they are bowing/kneeling as they pass a tabernacle containing the reserved sacrament.]

I bow during the Gloria and Doxology during that time when we invoke the Trinity as a sign of reverence to God.

During the Apostles' and Nicene Creed I often bow following the proclamation of the conception of Jesus until "on the third day..." in reverence to Jesus as my Lord. I make the sign of the cross when proclaiming my believe in "the resurrection of the dead" as an act of unity with the saints who have gone before.

You may also see me kiss the Bible after reading the Gospel. I picked this up from the Episcopal seminary when the Gospel Book is kissed. In Eastern Orthodox, Oriental Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Episcopal churches it is common for the priest/deacon/lectern to kiss various physical items as a sign of love for God.

While celebrating Holy Communion, I hold my hands down over the bread and cup, and lean forward to speak to the elements during the epiclesis (invocation of the Holy Spirit), following the rubric (instructions printed in red) from the Book of Worship and historic practice.

Likewise, I make the sign of the cross over the elements during the final prayer as a remembrance of God's presence.

At other times when I am not leading in worship, you might see me do the following:

During the celebration of Holy Communion during the anamnesis (recounting of Jesus) until Lord's Prayer, I kneel wherever I am. Although I picked this up at the Episcopal seminary, there were instructions in previous Methodist hymnals and books of worship for the people to kneel. {Fun tidbit: Methodists used to be mocked for kneeling more than Roman Catholics}

When presenting myself to receive Holy Communion, I do so with my hands crossed (i.e. sign of the cross) and palms up so that I can <u>receive</u> the body of Christ as a gift rather than taking it.

These are acts of personal piety that I engage in because when we come to worship we do so with our entire being. In Psalm 95 it says, "Let us kneel down and bow before our maker." It seems only appropriate to bow and bend my knee when I say those words. Our posture shapes how we experience the moments of life and worship. Just as some people raise their hands in prayer while looking toward heaven and others fold their hands as they bow their heads, we can have a variety of (continued from previous column)

postures and actions. These things can serve to focus our intentionality to worship. I once "tested" a congregation, by omitting the asterisk (*) from the bulletin before the hymn, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," just to see how many could sing those words while sitting. Towards the end of the first verse, one woman couldn't take it and stood up. In less than a second, the rest of the congregation joined her.

If there is a posture or ritual action that serves to focus your being on God's presence and your devotion, just do it. Don't hold back. Maybe someone will question you; or maybe they'll find permission to join you as we make a joyful noise together.




