### A Word From the Pastor

<sup>51</sup>Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, <sup>52</sup>in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be imperishable, and we will be raised changed. 53For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. 54When this perishable body puts on


imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled: "Death has been swallowed up in victory." 55 "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" 56 The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. 57 But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Listen, I Will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed. (1 Cor. 15:51) I recently attended a clergy breakfast in which the Rev. Dr. Thomas Long spoke about funerals. As a seminary professor, one might have expected that he would have focused on practical matters regarding funerals. Instead, he talked about historical funerary practice in Judaism and the Roman Empire and how those expressions found their way into Christian practice. More importantly, he talked about the theological reasons that Christians adopted certain practices, but also how many contemporary practices reflect where we have lost our biblical sense of eternal life.

Although he didn't quote her, at moments I heard Belinda Carlisle singing. Dr. Long pointed out that we often misunderstand heaven as a place to which we go when we die. Whereas the Bible seldom talks about heaven as a place to go, but instead the place from which God comes. Even in Revelation we hear that the New Jerusalem will descend (i.e. come to us), and Jesus repeatedly speaks about the kingdom of heaven coming into our midst and that it is "at hand." Eternal life isn't something for which we have to wait – the kingdom of heaven isn't a distant promise – instead eternal life ant the promise of heaven are within our reach as Christians. As Ms. Carlisle would sing, "They say in Heaven love comes first. We'll make Heaven a place on Earth."

I don't know that Ms. Carlisle is a Methodist, but John Wesley called good works a foretaste of heaven. When love comes first - when our first inclination is build up one another and to share hope -we catch a glimpse of God's glory and the fullness of life that comes in Jesus Christ. Death loses its victory and its sting because for those who live in Christ it frees us to express our love for God and one another more fully in this life – and without distraction – in the life to come.

you can put in your shoe box. There are 2 lists; one for girls and one for boys.


A very important part of packing the shoe box is to pray for the boy or girl that will be receiving the box.




