Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. ²And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; 4he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." 5 And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new."


Back in 2016, Thomson Reuters proffered The World in 2025: 10 Predictions of *Innovation*. Among their predictions were that teleportation (ala *Star Trek*) will be tested, food shortages and price fluctuations are things of the past, electric air transportation will be routine, and cancer treatments have few toxic side effects. I don't think we're going to see these predictions come true in the upcoming year. Some of the other predictions included that solar will be the largest source of energy for the planet, packaging will be biodegradable, there will be a prevalence of digital technology. That last one has certainly already come true. Meanwhile, solar energy and biodegradable packaging are expanding.

Even delayed, I hope that I will live to see the days without food shortages and price fluctuations and in which side-effect free cancer treatment abound. People are working towards those aims. Except for teleportation – it's not unreasonable to expect that the unfulfilled predictions for 2025 might manifest by 2050. Because we see progress.

New years bring with them a spirit of hope and anticipation. That spirit of hope leads to resolutions and commitment to bring those aspirations into fruition. Meanwhile, the temptation to regret last year's incomplete or failed plans can keep us from noticing progress – in particular – the progress of the kingdom of God.

Revelation ends with a particularly poignant prediction – a prediction that no temple will be present in the new Jerusalem. Instead, those whose names are written in the Lamb's book of life will know the immediate company of God. Oh, for that day. Maybe you have those days in which even in prayer you wonder if God is listening – or whether the church can survive especially in the context of small membership congregations. But

Although I don't expect that 2025 will necessarily be the year in which we walk the streets of the new Jerusalem, I know that when we reflect on those holy encounters of last year and the years before, we might just be able to see it coming – no matter how distant – and find ways to live into this year.






