A Word From the Pastor

Jesus looked at them and said, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible." (Mark 10:27 NRSV)

Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

When I was young, my parents invested in a set of Collier's Encyclopedias along with the annual yearbook updates. As useful as that was for school work, it was the other set of books that were more meaningful was Collier's "Junior Classics" - ten volumes of abridged literature, children's stories, fables and fairy tales. That was the set that my Dad would use to read us bedtime stories.

One of those stories was the story of The Little Red Hen. In the story, the little red hen asks her farmyard friends (the cat, the cow, and the horse) for help: first planting wheat, then harvesting the wheat, and then grinding the wheat. Each time the hen asks, "Who will help me...?" she gets the same reply from each of her friends: "Not I." Even when she asks for help baking bread on a cold winter day, she hears the same reply to her quest for help: "Not I..."

At each stage, the little red hen does all the work by herself. That is... until... her final request, "Who will help me eat the bread?" "Moo, I will!" "Neigh, I will!" "Meow, I will!" But the little red hen will have none of it. Instead, she reminds them that they'd each refused to help her at every stage of the work and that as she alone was responsible for the work – she alone would enjoy the bread. In the end, I understand why the red hen didn't see the need to share; but she was very uncharitable in asking who wanted a portion when she knew that she wouldn't share.

It reminds me of another very similar but also very different story: the story of stone soup. In that story a monk had visited house to house begging for alms, "Will you help me?" only to receive at each door, the same answer as the little red hen, "No!" But he did something different. He set himself up in the middle of the town square where he built a small fire and placed upon it a kettle of water. When curiosity drew people in to see and ask what he was doing, he told them he was making a special delicacy, stone soup; and then dropped a stone into the water. The people scoffed but hung around. When the monk tasted the soup, he said, "Now that's good. But it could do with a little salt. If only I had some." With that one of the townspeople ran off and returned with some salt. Again he tasted, "That's good. If only it had... a bit of pepper... a carrot... an onion... some chicken..." Each time another of the townspeople would say, "I can help," and then return with their morsel. Finally the monk announced that the soup was ready, and a great banquet was held in the town square that day.

In both stories the protagonist asks only to be told "No." The little red hen responds by becoming bitter and ornery intentionally withholding the bread. The monk on the other hand lived as if stone soup was enough, commenting only on how it could be improved with just "one" small addition, until everyone in the town had a chance to help, and then to enjoy together the feast.

How often are we like the little red hen: hurt and rejected? Only to respond in kind? How often are we like the cat, the cow, the horse: unwilling to help with even a small task? Then surprised when we miss out on the bounty? How often are we like the townspeople turning away a needy monk? How often are we willing to make a spectacle of what we do have in a way that draws in others with an invitation to shine with the little portion they bring?

The church is made of many members: some seeds to plant, carrots and onions to harvest, some little red hens that get thrown in the pot, all either working together for the kingdom of God and the banquet that awaits – or each neglecting to share the gift that God has made them to be so that everyone misses out.

You are an essential part of the body of Christ. What you have to offer means heaven to the world. Without you, something is missing. The "soup" might be tolerable. But is it as good as it can be to nourish the town. Too often we can get stuck on the idea that all we have (or are) is useless stones. Too often we can think what is my little bit among so much need: for the world or my congregation. But God has promised that his grace is sufficient and that all things are possible when we put our trust in him.

As we prepare for the season of Lent, will you claim that opportunity to be a part of Christ's body – the church – so that even in the silliest spectacle others might be drawn in and find their place to shine in the simplest things with we who do the same? When any part of the body suffers, we all suffer? When any of us refuses the invitation to contribute to the cause, we risk missing out on the heavenly banquet ourselves. But when any of us shine in the tiniest thing – we all shine the glory of his kingdom into the world. May this season be a season to be "seasoned" anew as we each claim the opportunity to make God's kingdom more appealing for one another and for the world that sees it as little more than stone soup?

They are a credit to the organization, and to this church and community.




